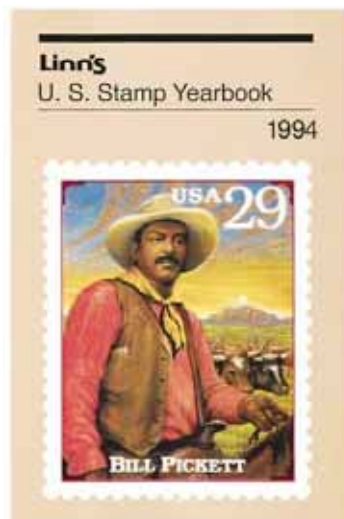

This month, we are delighted that noted writer George Amick will be giving a presentation. Mr. Amick is a journalist and stamp writer from Ewing Township who has been collecting stamps for nearly 60 years.

Mr. Amick has degrees in journalism from Ohio Wesleyan and Ohio State universities, was a Nieman journalism fellow at Harvard University and an Air Force veteran of the Korean War. He currently writes the "Capital Talk" column for the *Trenton Times*.



Mr. Amick has written the annual *U.S. Stamp Yearbook* published by Linn's Stamp News since 1988 as well as numerous articles on a wide

range of subjects in philatelic publications. His book *Jenny!* tells the story of the 24¢ inverted-center airmail stamp of 1918. He is in the APS Writer's Unit Hall of Fame. We are sure he will give us a very interesting presentation.

November Library Exhibits

HTPS is displaying philatelic items at the Hamilton Library during November. Tony is coordinating this effort.

Please consider displaying something from your collection. ANY type of philatelic material is suitable including stamps, covers, postcards or publications. There are 3 display cases measuring 26x58 inches and a circular case with two 24 inch shelves.

The following displays are currently planned:

- Postcards (NYC, Humor, Fishing)
- US Naval Covers
- WW Souvenir Sheets
- Book of French Remembrances

We have the materials needed including poster boards and mounting supplies. The Poster Boards measure 22x26 inches and fill up fairly quick. However, any size display is welcome. We can create Title Headers and any other descriptions needed for your display.

HTPS Lending Library

A Stamp Collecting Vacation in London

Whenever I go traveling, whether on business or for pleasure, I always try to check out the stamp collecting scene at my destination. Last years' trip to London was no exception, and given the timing of the trip coincided with a major stamp show, it had even more emphasis on my favorite hobby.

Late September is the time of the STAMPEX fall show, usually held at a small convention hall in Issington, just north of central London. The first thing you notice is how formal the show is, with many people wearing jackets. The front of the hall had a large British Post Office, with all the currently available stamps for sale. The central hall had about 50 dealers, both British and European (and even a few Americans). Most of the booths, however, were very small and there are no chairs or stools to sit on. This reminded me very much of many of the booths at the recent Washington Expo.

The main problem, however, was the cost of the material. The English prefer high quality material, and are willing to pay a premium for it. While I picked up a few odds and ends on the main floor, I thought the prices were too high. The bargains can be found in the balcony area, which contains a number of smaller dealers, many with large cartons of covers, old catalogs, and less expensive stamps. I spend most of my time "upstairs."

The center of the stamp collecting universe, at least for the British Empire, is the Stanley Gibbons store, located on the Strand in downtown



London. The front of store contains supplies and albums.

While I was tempted to buy a few things, I was worried about carrying heavy books back home. The rear of the store contains the stamp counter with hundreds of stamp albums to look at. While the looking is free, it only takes a short time to

realize that these, too, are very pricy. In the middle of the store, there is a small book rack containing a selection of used catalogs and stamp-related books at discounted prices. I suspect these books come from estates that Gibbons is liquidating. As the selection is changed at random times, I always try to stop in whenever I am in the neighborhood to see if anything new has arrived.

There are a number of other stamp dealers in the same area. I always stop at Vera Trinder, located in a basement shop, just around the corner from Gibbons. The shop deals mostly in stamp supplies. They have a bin of overstocked and outdated catalogs where I found a number of nice catalogs at around £3 (~\$6) each.

There are also numerous weekly or monthly stamp bourses around London. One of my favorites is held on Saturday mornings at an underground parking garage near the Charing Cross train station. There are about 15 dealers set up on folding tables. While the lighting is not great, and there is the occasional car trying to exit the garage, the dealers have a nice selection of lower cost material. For example, I picked up a number of Indian States covers at 50p (~\$1) each.

If you are ever in London, don't forget to visit the Queen's Philatelic collection at the British Library. While only small portion of the collection is on display to the public, it is certainly worth a visit. However, you need to arrange in advance if you wish to see more of the collection or to use their massive reference library.

Of course, London is not the only place where you can have a stamping vacation. In Paris, be sure to visit the open air stamp bourse just off the Champs Elysees on weekends. In Madrid, the Plaza de Mayor has an open air bourse on Sundays. Wherever you travel, be sure to check out the philatelic scene. You never know what you might find.
