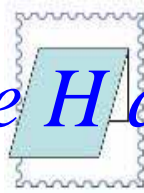

## The PNSE Stamp Show

After a year's absence, the Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition (PNSE) re-emerged last month to outstanding reviews. The APS World Series Show, held on April 9-11, included over 200 exhibit frames and 30 dealers from across the U.S.

The new venue at the Greater Philadelphia Expo Center was large enough to easily accommodate both exhibits and dealers in one room. The Center is located in Oaks, PA, about an hour's drive from Hamilton Township, NJ.

Along with the wide range of exhibits, there were enough seminars and presentations to keep you busy for the three day event. Several stamp groups, including the United States Stamp Society, held meetings at the show.

One of the big draws was the dealers who stopped in Pennsylvania on the way to the big New York show the next week. Among them were Michael and Cecilia Ball from Phoenix, AZ who brought their "Wall of Stamps" with 300 red boxes (see photo below).

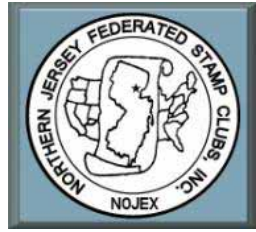


I had time to visit a number of the dealers and picked up some interesting items for my collection. The exhibits also held my interest particularly the three Washington Franklin collections.

## Hamilton Township Public Library

The Governor's proposed state budget reduces library funding substantially. These cuts eliminate internet access, electronic journals in hundreds of libraries and the inter-library loan program. The loss of these programs will put more pressure on local property taxes.

The proposed legislation, Assembly Bill A2555, will eliminate funding for libraries and will result in fewer books, fewer hours and fewer services. THIS MAY DIRECTLY IMPACT THE USE OF THE LIBRARY COMMUNITY ROOM FOR OUR MEETINGS.

More than 170,000 people in New Jersey use our libraries every day. The Hamilton library provides our meeting space and custodial services in setting up our work areas. Please help maintain this support by contacting your legislators asking them to restore library funding and oppose Assembly Bill A2555.

- ⇒ Call, email or write to ALL of them asking that they restore the library cuts.

Readers from other towns can select their own district number and contact their representatives.

## Philatelic Foundation

On April 15, Ed Murtha, Ron Gonzalez and I visited the Philatelic Foundation (PF) located at 70 West 40th Street in NYC. Our purpose was to tour the facility, noted for its expertise in philatelic identification, and to drop off some items for certification.

"The Philatelic Foundation was granted a charter in 1945 by the University of the State of New York as a Nonprofit Educational Institution. Over the decades the Philatelic Foundation has come to be recognized as the central source for expertise in philately. This confidence has been built through our certification service, reference collection and publications." (Source: PF Website)

We were met by David Petruzelli who guided us through this unique institution and introduced us to Betsy Diaz and Lewis Kaufman, two of the staff who work there. David explained the process of certification at the Foundation. We learned that most U.S. and many of the foreign items are expertized on site by the PF staff. When needed, items are sent to outside experts for further evaluation.

It's easy to see why most of the work is done on site. There were thousands of reference publications, correspondence, research notes and photographic records, including over 400,000 PF-certified items, housed at this location.

It was an enjoyable first leg of the day's philatelic journey that included a visit to the Collectors Club and a final stop at the Mega Show.
